### Sustainer Salute by Nancy Reed

# BOBBIE GEE

Bobbie Gee is well known about Abilene for her support of the arts and community programs, in particular the Abilene Philharmonic, and so she was somewhat surprised when we called on her as a Sustainer Salute. She said to me that the Philharmonic honored her in 2008 as Grande Dame at the Gold Medallion Ball, and that the Commentator highlighted her a few years back — what more could people want to know? Aside from having many new Junior League of Abilene (JLA) members who have not met her, what is so special about

Bobbie is that even now as a Sustainer Emeritus, she still has her unfailing enthusiasm for women and volunteering in this community. She continues to see needs and commits her time and energy help people improve their lives.

She joined JLA in the 1950s, shortly after the group with had joined Association Junior Leagues (now AJLI). She recalls at the time, the

group's excitement at having been accepted into AJLI in record time. This was due to their quick acting member leaders who had transferred in from other leagues and understood what policies and procedures should be enacted to join AJLI. As a Provisional, she remembers what an honor and how intimidating her first year was. Throughout the 1-year course, provisional members could never miss a meeting or show up late, not even 5 minutes. These young women in their early 20s not only looked up to their 35-40 year old women leaders, but also were in awe of them — they were stylish, well-educated and capable women who got jobs done. Stylish, educated and capable — how some things just don't change!

Bobbie continues to view JLA as a wonderful organization offering excellent training opportunities for women and enriching the lives of women and

their families. She fondly recalls that her training for fundraising came from JLA experiences. It started with their citywide fundraiser, an annual garage sale where every member was required to donate \$50 worth of goods to sell. The challenge was that the items had to be numerous and in meticulous condition, so for example her husband's shirts had to be mended,

buttons sewed back on, washed and ironed — and they would sell for 25 cents a piece; her children's shoes had to be cleaned and with fresh laces. Not only was this the beginning of Bobbie's fundraising experiences with Abilene groups for decades to come, it was also the start of her daughter's who took the idea with her to college and shared it with her sorority and another community. Bobbie continues to share her knack for fundraising and is active with Community Foundation of Abilene, Abilene Civic Center, Paramount Theatre, The Grace Museum, Abilene Woman's Club and Abilene Cultural Affairs Council.

Joining JLA in the 1950s was unique because it was the only place a woman could volunteer. Now, there are dozens of non-profit organizations recruiting women volunteers. Bobbie is proud that JLA is largely responsible for having created these opportunities over the last 50 years- places such as West Texas Rehab, Philharmonic Guild and RSVP just to name a few. Bobbie encourages women to join JLA today because of the high regard and community wide respect for the group. Also, she notes that the training and networking opportunities cannot be gotten anywhere else. Other groups in town still seek JLA members as volunteers for their own boards, committees and projects. She applauds today's women for doing so much with their time and carrying on the league's legacy. She sees a definite need for JLA to continue it's work in improving the lives of children and families in Abilene. She is concerned for the young people whose families are struggling with drugs, violence and lack of education. Bobbie we'll continue to do our best, and we salute you for paving the way and offering your encouragement — thank you for your energy and inspiration!

# PROJECT EVALUATION PROCESS by Kari Polk

Where has 2009 gone? It's hard to believe 2010 is here! With the start of the new calendar year comes Project Evaluation. The Project Evaluation Committee consists of seven elected Active members, the President, the President-Elect, the Treasurer, Secretary, Membership Development Director, and Community Director. Every member of the Project Evaluation Committee has a vote except the Community Director who only votes to break a tie.

The Project Evaluation Committee meets for three days (usually Tuesday and Thursday evenings and Sunday afternoon). The current project chairs present their projects to the Committee. They make recommendations based on their assessment of the year in areas such as committee involvement, community relationships, money needed and spent, etc. The Project Research Chairman has been investigating possible projects since May. She presents the most suitable ones to the committee.

On the final day, the Project Evaluation Committee reviews and discusses all the presentations. They take into consideration the following:

- Does the project support the Mission
- What funds are available
- What funds are needed
- What volunteers are needed
- What are the opportunites, etc.

After carefully weighing all the considerations, the committee votes on the projects to present to the membership with the

following recommendations: continuation as is; continuation with modifications; or termination.

The project slate is presented in the form of a Project Proposal Booklet at the January General Membership Meeting. During that meeting league members break out into small groups and discuss proposed projects at length.




At the March General Membership meeting, the vote occurs. If all projects pass, the Membership Development Committee begins placing the project chairs. If a project does not pass, that project's funds and volunteers are reallocated to other projects and the reallocation goes to the general membership for a vote.

Each year, we are reminded that all aspects of the Project Evaluation process are confidential and are not to be discussed outside the League. This protects those involved in the project as well as the organizations we work with.

Thank you to those who served on the Project Evaluation Committee this year. You have spent many long hours forming the best recommendation for the League. We appreciate your commitment, time and knowledge.

The Project Evaluation Committee is a great way to learn a lot about how the League selects their projects. It's an honor for me to serve on it this year.
